

LEARN A RHYME, MAKE A TOY, PLAY OUTSIDE



Yesterday spring shouted out that it's COMING, with beautiful sunshine and warm weather. But winter raged back this morning, blowing snow, and sprinkling ice pellets, saying loud and clear it had not yet spoken its last word. Funny this end of winter feeling of resilience as we rest assured -- despite climate changes -- that


spring will come in its own good time. Fred Cogswell wrote in his 1954 poem *New Brunswick*: "Toughened by suns and bleak wintry weather. To grow up slow and to endure for long; We have not gained to any breadth or length, and all our beauty is our stubborn strength."

This winter deep snow piled up in the forest and in our back yards, and I was told that deer were seen, more than usual, around houses, in the villages and even on paved roads. Some cheeky deer even braved the shiny lights of the local Tim Hortons one night to feast on our once perfect red cedar tree. Prints in the snow were clear as well as the telltale evidence of broken tips and gaping holes. We thought that they were running out of food in the forest but an experienced hunter explained that the deep snow made it difficult for deer to outrun coyotes. Deer know that their fierce enemy really dislikes coming close to human dwellings so they gather near them in small groups ready to jump out of sight, strong, resilient, and beautiful.

We went picture hunting for deer prints and trails which we found all over the grounds of the Woodmen's Museum and beside the Salmon Museum we found the very fresh signs of the presence of coyotes.







The picture on the left is of a deer trail, but the photo in the middle is of the coyote trail made by the trotting pace of the animal. The paw print were taken from Mark Elbrock's publication *Mammal Tracks & Signs*. Collecting pictures of trails and paw prints is a great winter activity for adults and children. Even very young children can be interested when you express your fascination with this activity. You can first make them notice the trails and prints and then you can help identify them using a computer or a good book on the subject. You can encourage children to fill a scrapbook with their collection of pictures and even drawings – it's a nice show piece for family and friends! Young children develop a very real impulse to collect around the age of four or five years old. Did you know that this is a sign that their minds are acquiring pre-mathematical skills? Collecting is regrouping, associating, matching and counting.








DOAKTOWN, NEW BRUNSWICK
