






#### **REMEMBRANCE DAY**

# WHAT IS A VETERAN?

A veteran is any former member of the Canadian Armed Forces who successfully underwent basic training and was honourably discharged.

With civil and military unrest happening around the globe and people struggling to find their way in life, along with our veterans diminishing in number, never before in our history has it been so important to educate the youth of today.

Cemeteries in Europe are full of Canada's young men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice and never returned home. These veterans have paved the way for future generations to live the lives they choose to, and ask for nothing in return, except to "not be forgotten." As veterans of the Great War are virtually non-existent, and World War II veterans fade away, this cannot be overstated.

The world today is a drastically different place then the one these veterans grew up in and went to foreign lands to defend. If they were here today, I believe they would say, "WOW, we have lost our way." Yet at the same time marvel at the thought that we are still a free and democratic society due in no small part to their sacrifice. A growing number of young people, through no fault of their own, are not aware of the significance of Remembrance Day or the horrors of the Holocaust. The onus is on us as parents and educators to explain and keep their cause and memory alive.

It is equally as important to remember our modern-day veterans. Unlike their fathers before them, fallen soldiers of recent conflicts are re-repatriated, allowing families to lay them to rest, providing closure for families and loved ones.

Veterans of today, like veterans of the past, rarely, if ever, talk of their experiences. They seek solace in the company of fellow vets, as they struggle, in a lot of cases, to fit back into society. Soldiers do not have the luxury of selecting where they serve - they serve at the discretion of the government.

# WHAT IS A VETERAN? CONT..

When people think of veterans, many picture someone who served in World War I, World War II or the Korean War, rightfully so. It is important that we never forget this. As well, it is equally important to recognize the "modern day" veterans. Veterans of Cyprus, Golan Heights, Afghanistan, Bosnia, Ukraine and the Middle East to name a few that our Canadian Armed Forces members have taken part in.

• More than 650,000 Canadians served in World War I, more than 66,000 gave their lives to the cause.

• More than ONE MILLION Canadians served in World War II, over 45,400 lost their lives and another 55,000 were wounded – a staggering number given our population during this time was somewhere between 11 and 12 million

• More than 40,000 Canadians served during the Afghanistan War, 158 gave their lives with numerous post war deaths from suicide.


• Some 40,000 Canadians served in the former Yugoslavia, 23 members lost their lives.

 Over the years, an additional 130 Canadians have died in course of peace support operations overseas.



Welcome to the new community news provider the Doaktown Headwaters. It is in the infancy stage but will grow with your feedback and input. I am very pleased with the effort put forth by the committee which was tasked with producing this product. Their time, knowledge, and effort is appreciated very much.

In the beginning, I was asked if I would submit something in regards to the activity in council. After much thought, it seemed more appropriate to address one or two subjects each month. I decided to go with what appears to be the "hot topic" of the month or something which is forefront in the immediate future. For the initial issue, I will address public safety in our village along with the outcome of several meetings with our RCMP Sergeant.

This message to the community is intended to provide some information in regards to what appears to be an increase in crime within the village of Doaktown. It is also a means of providing direction to the public on the proper reporting procedures to ensure action can be taken.

There are two types of crime being reported to the municipality. Laws which are being broken in regards to by-laws governed at the municipal level, which we as council are directly responsible for. The other crimes which are being brought to our attention through social media, council, and law enforcement deal primarily with the Police Act.

The RCMP is the agency the municipality pays to enforce the Police Act and crimes such as speeding, break and enter, vandalism, ATVs on Route 8 and major crime. The first three have increased significantly in the area. Council has met to discuss these reported issues with the sergeant in charge at the Blackville Detachment.

Several initiatives are being employed to mitigate these crimes. For instance, the village of Doaktown has purchased and set up a sign entering the school zone at the east end of town to warn drivers of their speed. In the summer, it was moved to the picnic site for drivers coming in from the west.

On the RCMP front, they are employing a more aggressive stance on speeding – bypassing warnings for both excessive speed and ATVs on main roads, moving directly to fines and impounding ATVs. RCMP are stepping up patrols during heightened times in which thefts and vandalism are being carried out. We are also working together to provide the public education and the best means for reporting. If the public wishes to report a crime of this nature, the following is the only effective way to get action carried out:

- Call 9-1-1
- Let the operator know what crime is being committed
- Where it is being committed
- Any details (licence plate, how many involved, etc.)
- Your name
- Your contact information
- Meet with the responding officer when he arrives and give a statement

Reporting that does not work:

- Social media (the RCMP do not monitor social media)
- Village Office or Village Council (The RCMP does not accept second or third hand information. We cannot make a statement on something we have not witnessed.)

*Note*: Reporting crime to the Village Office for information to inform the RCMP of general areas of concern, but specific crimes will not be relayed to the RCMP.

The RCMP and Council will continue to work together in an attempt to reduce crime. The citizens are encouraged to report to the RCMP and follow through on their complaints.

The citizens of the village have clearly been unhappy with the manner in which by-laws are dealt with. Since the village was incorporated, there has been conflict between neighbours on laws that govern our community: excessive noise, unsightly premises, building zones and many others.

When violations are reported, the following administrative action will be taken:

- a letter with a copy of the by-law goes to the citizen explaining which by-law has been broken
- Possible action that can be taken will be included.

The Greater Miramichi Region has proposed that a by-law enforcement company be contracted to cover all communities within our region in 2024. The cost would be split according to requirements. This will follow the same administrative procedure from the past but enforcement will then be turned over to this potential service provider for action. Non-compliance will eventually end in court proceedings.

We all hope that this service is not required; our hope is that we follow the by-laws in place and make every effort to get along with our neighbours. By-laws can be changed in many circumstances. We urge you to get engaged with council, have dialogue, present your ideas for consideration, be respectful of others and their ideas. Let's all work together to make this a safe and friendly community.



# Welcome to Doaktown

# Learn a Rhyme, Make a Toy & Play Outside

We are living in chilling and uncertain times, as we often need to block our news feeds to bring ourselves back to our quiet reality, peaceful environment, colourful nature, and thoughtful neighbours.

So many in the world could use a bit of this magic right now! All WE have to do is go for a walk, breath in the clean air, listen to the whispering woods and watch the river flowing. Kids love to go walking with family members and friends, shuffling leaves on the ground, picking up sticks and looking for deer. We propose this simple activity more as a reminder to take the time to do it. Bring a basket and collect beautiful leaves, wild rose hips, twigs, dried berries, feathers, and green moss. Make a mother earth talisman with the children and bring a little magic to your house or your garden. Here is how to make one with your kids or grandkids. Take a few wild apples. Peel them leaving part of the skin on top of the apples with their stem and leaves. Then with a pencil, mark the areas where eyes, nose, mouth, and ears would be. Carve out those areas of the apples with a plastic knife. Then dip the apples in one cup of water, a third of a cup of lemon juice and one tablespoon of salt. Stick the apples on a wooden spike and let dry for a few weeks. The apples will shrivel too look like old human faces sometime called shrunken apple heads. Choose the nicest one. Make a large cone with sturdy cardboard. With left over cotton or wool make some hair and with autumn leaves glued together on the cone make a wide skirt and shirt with long sleeves. Mount the shrunken apple head on top of the cone. Glue the end of the sleeves to a walking stick made from a small branch. Make a crown with dried berries and rose hips. Add a shawl made from left over material. There you have it: a mother earth talisman to bring beauty, abundance, peace, and health to your home. A little magic and a deep wish for all the homes on earth.

# Doaktown Elementary

## New AED

Doaktown Elementary School is proud to share that we now have an AED (Automated External Defibrillator) on site in our breezeway area. This has been made possible through the Heart and Stroke Foundation of New Brunswick's Restart a Heart-Restart a Life initiative in partnership with the New Brunswick Emergency Medical Services (NBEMS). The goal is to help improve the survival rate of sudden cardiac arrest in New Brunswick. Approximately 1000 New Brunswickers die of sudden cardiac arrest each year. Currently the odds of survival for an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest are only 5%. Defibrillation when used with CPR can improve cardiac arrest survival rates up to 70% if delivered in the first few minutes.





